Among the acres of spare, buttoned-down furniture, it was nice to see things that struck a blow for the cozy and even the frivolous. Clockwise from left: Andrée Putman's FELUCA CONSOLE for Poltrona Frau has a leathercovered top that flips open to reveal a dressing table with storage compartments and a mirror. The choose BED SCONCE by Matteo Thun for Artemide incorporates light-diffusing slits in a polycarbonate shade. Thun teamed up with Antonio Rodriguez on the velvet-covered s. MARCO CHAIR for Driade; its small scale encourages intimate conversation. The sacco BEANBAG CHAIR, a mod classic designed in 1968 by Gatti, Paolini and Teodoro for Zanotta, is now available in synthetic patent leather in a girly lipstick red. A floor version of the cHOOSE

LAMP has a shade that tilts to
aim light where it's needed. The

KENNEDEE D. POUF, part of JeanMarie Massaud's update of traditional tufted upholstery for Poltrona Frau, went for Baroque this year with burgundy velvet. A Victorian staple is given the starlet treatment in Inga Sempé's CHANTILLY SOFA for Edra; its loose-fitting satin cover suggests a certain naughtiness.



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
