


Matteo Thun creates a Venetian island resort

In building-crammed Venice, a simple tree can be a rare sight, which is why the newest launch from hotel group JW Marriott comes as a breath of fresh air.

Built on Isola delle Rose, the largest of the hundreds of islets scattered across the lagoon, the property is like a floating slice of countryside, with its 20 buildings - a hotel, private villas and a spa and wellness centre surrounded by a lush park of olive trees, ivytrellised terraces and a vegetable garden that supplies the two restaurants with produce.

'This is a return to nature,' says Milanbased architect Matteo Thun, who with partner Luca Colombo not only designed the buildings, but also the landscaping that unfurls across the 160,000 sq m property. 'Empty spaces are a luxury for Venice.'

A former convalescent hospital, the original structures date back to 1936. Rather than toppling the abandoned buildings, Thun restored each, then built new structures within the original frames without touching the existing walls. 'When you're inside, it feels modern,' says Thun, 'but from the outside, everything appears as it once was.'

Thun's 'box-in-a-box' principle allows for an authentic rendition of the buildings. 'I can't stand the "fake old" thing,' the >>

architect observes of Venice's many artificially produced 'historic' hotels. But his interiors are strictly non-nostalgic, focusing on his design doctrine of sustainability and zero waste.

A reliance on local suppliers means there are textiles from Rubelli, customised light installations by Barovier & Toso, bathroom fixtures from Zuchetti, handblown spherical glass lamps by Antonio Rodriguez, produced by Artemide, and furniture crafted from local wood. Meanwhile, all of the treatment rooms in the spa as well as the rooftop infinity pool offer views of the Venetian skyline. 'You can see the sunset over Piazza San Marco,' says the architect.
